Entomology is conside	 The objective of the Diploma Course is to prepare physicians for professional missions in tropical and subtropical countries, to teach them the skills to diagnose and to treat tropical diseases in travellers and migrants and to enable them to provide pre-travel health advice. The central topics of the Diploma Course are human diseases that are especially prevalent in tropical and developing countries. Teaching focuses on the pathogenesis, diagnosis, clinical presentation, treatment, epidemiology and prophylaxis of parasitic, bacterial, viral and non-communicable tropical diseases. At the same time, biology, epidemiology and control of pathogens as well as their vectors and reservoirs are addressed. Further topics include the particular features of the various clinical disciplines in tropical environments, aspects of community health in poor countries, structures of medical developmental cooperation, and health in emergencies. The curriculum is divided into twelve sections of one week each. Differential diagnosis is the major guideline for the curriculum. Entomology is considered in its relation to the etiology and transmission of disease. Malaria, tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS, because of their outstanding relevance, are regarded as separate topics.
