Brief course description	The Diploma in Tropical Medicine (DTM) is offered in a modular format comprised of four intensive modules and a lab practical. Students can take all modules in the same year or enroll in fewer modules per year. However, to earn the DTM, all four modules and the lab practical must be successfully completed within 36 months. Completion of this program will prepare health care professionals to sit for the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (ASTMH) Certificate of Knowledge in Clinical Tropical Medicine and Travelers' Health (CTropMed®) Exam.		This course will be administered annually to a unique group of physicians: those accepting international employment within BIPAI's Texas Children's Global Health Corps and those accepted into the Baylor College of Medicine, Department of Pediatrics Global Health Residency program. The four-week didactic course will closely mimic the examination outline and the seven major content areas specified by the ASTMH. Faculty for the course will be comprised of highly-trained and experienced physicians and teachers with international experience. Our intensive course will put a particularly heavy emphasis on the management of Pediatric HIV/AIDS in resource limited settings. This course will be followed by ongoing, in-country field experience. Physicians working at one of our centers will be able to network electronically with one another and with Houston based faculty for purposes of consultation on difficult cases and ongoing mentorship.

Brief course description	<p>The objective of the Diploma Course is to train physicians to be able to work in countries of the tropics or subtropics. The course is also intended to enable participants to diagnose and treat diseases in travellers and migrants from the tropics and subtropics and to provide preventive medical travel-related advice.</p> <p>The focus of the course is on the aetiology, epidemiology, clinical presentation, diagnosis and treatment of tropical diseases and clinical work in low resource settings. The curriculum also covers travel medicine and principles of global health.</p> <p>Curriculum: The course teaches the following knowledge and skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Epidemiology, diagnosis and treatment of tropical and travel associated diseases including bacterial, viral, mycotic and parasitic infections and venomous animal accidents. • Medical advice before travel and foreign assignments including prophylactic measures. • Principles of public health in low and middle income countries. • Principles of occupational health for travellers with long-term stays. • Indications, proper sample collection and handling for laboratory examinations and classification of the results in the respective clinical profile. • Microscopic detection of protozoa, worms and parasites. 		<p>Given in Lima, Peru, this unique tropical medicine training initiative combines an international faculty with didactic and formal bedside teaching right in the tropics. Intensive diploma course in English with 380 contact hours: 160 formal lecture hours, plus diagnostic laboratory, daily ward rounds on a 36-bed tropical disease unit or daily out-patient clinic, and case conferences. Two 4-day teaching trips to field clinics in the Andes and Amazon. Scholarships are available to those who are both nationals and residents of a Latin American Country. Brief course description	Our programme raises awareness of global health concerns and allows students to identify and analyse key factors shaping the health and well-being of populations. As a multidisciplinary approach it combines public health, epidemiology, tropical medicine, economics and management sciences, among others. The course is concerned with topics such as health promotion and prevention, treatment of poverty-related diseases, rehabilitation, strengthening health systems and informing health policy. The Diploma consists of a 13 week Core Course plus two advanced modules: Parasitology in International Health and Clinical Management of Tropical Diseases.	The Summer Institute in Tropical Medicine and Public Health is designed to provide training in key topics in tropical medicine and related public health issues through a multidisciplinary approach. It is also designed to prepare participants to work on current and emerging health problems in developing countries and the health problems of travelers. The curriculum contains current concepts and breakthrough research related to some of the most important tropical diseases today, and a host of expert lecturers present the most up-to-date findings on their work in these topics; Module I: Tuberculosis, HIV and Other Chronic Infections in the Tropics (223.685) Module II: Vector Borne Diseases in the Tropics (223.688) Module III: Intestinal Infections in the Tropics (223.688) Module IV: Child and Public Health In the Tropics (223.686)

Brief course description	<p>The Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine is the oldest school of tropical medicine in the world, and still at the forefront of research and education today with a research portfolio in excess of £210 million. This 13 week well-established programme, which is over 118 years old, gives an excellent grounding in tropical medicine and public health for low resource settings. Practical teaching of diagnostic parasitology and vector biology is strong and all teaching is by faculty with extensive experience of working in low resource settings. Students come from a wide variety of international backgrounds and their expertise is shared in a friendly atmosphere. Students range in experience from newly qualified doctors who have completed foundation training to vastly experienced physicians who have decided to spend part of their retirement working in the field. Students use the programme as a springboard into careers in many fields including international and humanitarian health, infectious disease and travel medicine.</p>		<p>The Diploma in Tropical Medicine & Hygiene (DTM&H) is an intensive, three-month, full-time course in tropical medicine and public health for physicians. The course aims to teach doctors the skills required to understand, diagnose, treat and prevent diseases that are especially prevalent in tropical and developing countries where resources may be limited. The course has a strong epidemiological base but the scientific basis of infectious diseases is also given priority.</p> <p>A particular feature of the course is the diversity of students who attend. Among the 70 students who take the diploma course each year, more than 25 different countries are usually represented. Students range in experience from recently qualified doctors (though usually no earlier than 3 years post-graduation) to specialist infectious disease physicians and surgeons with many years of experience working in tropical and developing countries.</p> <p>The course is continually updated in response to changing needs, new developments in knowledge and technology, and student feedback. It has remained highly popular with students throughout its history which spans over 100 years.</p>

Brief course description	<p>The East African DTM&H is a collaboration between LSHTM, University of Washington (UW), Johns Hopkins University (JHU), Kilimanjaro Christian Medical University College (KCMUC) and Makerere University (MU). The 3-month short course is based entirely in East Africa with the first six weeks at KCMUC in Moshi, Tanzania, and the second six weeks at MU in Kampala, Uganda. All students travel from Moshi to Kampala mid-way through the course.</p> <p>The East African DTM&H takes the essence of the London course and translates it in to an African context. It emphasises experiential learning by immersing students in the clinical and public health issues facing African doctors today. Small group sessions are led by experienced physicians and at least a quarter of the course material is directly related to clinical practice.</p> <p>On completing the course we hope you will have gained an insight in to the practical realities of healthcare in East Africa. You should be able to evaluate the evidence for various health interventions, both public and individual, and make a safe and competent assessment of sick patients. In essence we intend the course to prepare you for a broad range of health work in Africa.</p>		<p>Possess academic and professional ethics, gain able to theoretical and practical knowledge of tropical medicine as well as current medical innovations and practical applications, be able to efficiently analyze and solve problems related to tropical medicine using theoretical knowledge clinical experience gained during the program, work efficiently in a team or individually, conscientiously develop new skills and knowledge and utilize them effectively, be able to present and transfer knowledge and information using appropriate media and information technology resources.</p>

Brief course description	The Nagasaki Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (DTM&H) is an 11-week, full time taught course in Nagasaki and the Philippines (subject to travel restrictions). It is the only DTM&H course in Japan. The course is taught by lecturers from Japan, UK, and other countries who have clinical as well as research experience in tropical diseases. This course is intensive and designed to equip medical doctors with knowledge and skills necessary to work effectively in resource limited regions, especially useful to the doctors who are planning to go to work in international health missions and those who would like to work in travel clinics.	<p>This postgraduate certificate programme consists of three short courses:</p> <p>Research Approaches in International Health (one month, Sept, English only) This is an introductory course to research approaches in international health. It covers different research disciplines, including epidemiology and statistics, social sciences, and implementation research. It prepares the participant to recognise, appraise and use a variety of health research methods, both quantitative and qualitative.</p> <p>Challenges in International Health (three months: Okt-Dec English, March-June French) This 12-week course will provide the participant with a good understanding of the complex picture of health challenges globally in general and in deprived, vulnerable settings in particular.</p> <p>Tropical Medicine and Clinical Decision Making (three months, Jan-March, English only) This part focuses on descriptive pathology, laboratory practices and clinical decision-making adapted to low-resource settings and tropical district hospitals. This specialised clinical course is primarily designed for medical doctors who have no or little professional experience in (low-resource) tropical settings, as well as for clinicians working or planning to work in non-tropical settings with travelers and migrants.</p>

Brief course description	This course is designed to provide training in tropical medicine and global public health issues through a multidisciplinary approach to disease. Traveler's health is covered in detail as well. The course is divided into four modules: Module 1 - Introduction to Global Public Health; Module 2 - Clinical Practice in the Tropics and Traveler's Health; Module 3 - Medical Parasitology and Simulations; and Module 4 - Infectious Diseases. Modules 1, 2, 3, and 4 are offered online, with an in-person lab component (July 10 - 14, 2023). Participants who take Modules 1, 2, 3, and 4 will have two years to complete the coursework. Participants may take one or more modules in a given year and in any order. Lectures, laboratory components and detailed case studies will examine specific tropical diseases and stress diagnosis, treatment, and implementation of preventive and control measures. In addition to Parasitology, Module 3 also contains simulations in Ultrasound, Neonatal Resuscitation, and Peds Procedural Pearls.
